St Irenaeus of Lyon helps us understand the mass

St Irenaeus lived from about 130AD to 202AD in Lyon which is in the country we now call France, but which was then called Gaul, and which was an area of the Roman Empire, as Briton then was. He was taught the faith by St Polycarp, and St Polycarp was taught the faith by St John the Apostle. St Irenaeus wrote a book correcting wrong ideas about our Catholic faith, and stating again the faith that had been received from the Apostles. How he describes the presence of Jesus in the bread and wine of the mass can be helpful to us.

Since the 13th century, the customary way we have described the change which takes place at the consecration at mass is by the term transubstantiation, but it uses technical words and concepts (substance and accidents) which belong to the philosophical system of Aristotle, with which we are not familiar in our ordinary ways of thinking. Our understanding is confused further by the fact that we have two English words—substance and accidents—which are totally unrelated and absolutely different to their meaning for Aristotle

St Irenaeus' words from the 2nd century defend the same truth as the doctrine of transubstantiation, but in a way which is perhaps easier for us to understand. He wrote

"The bread, which is produced from the earth, when it receives the invocation of God, is no longer common bread, but the Eucharist. It consists of two realities, earthly and heavenly."

When St Irenaeus wrote about "the invocation of God" he is talking about the Eucharistic Prayer of the mass. He is saying that because of the consecration of the bread and wine through the priest, they are no longer just earthly realities, but also heavenly realities, the Body and Blood of Christ.

The earthly realities of bread and wine continue to exist after the consecration, but they contain another reality—a heavenly one— which cannot be removed—the Body and Blood of Jesus.

This is the same teaching as transubstantiation but expressed in words and concepts that are probably easier for most of us to understand.
